

Mrs. Elsie M. Frey Honored

Mrs. Elsie M. Frey of Santa Barbara was recently honored by the Santa Barbara Branch of the American Begonia Society with a life membership in the American Begonia Society in gratitude for her help in founding the organization in May, 1940, her untiring efforts during the early years of the Branch in sponsoring study groups, and her presidency for the years 1941 and 1942. She was also commended for the recognition which she has brought to herself and the Branch in begonia hybridization, which she has carried on since 1939.

Presentation of the life membership card was made on behalf of the Santa Barbara Branch by Rudolf Ziesenhenne, its charter president, who outlined Mrs. Frey's many contributions to the Society. Although a busy housewife and mother

of four young children, Mrs. Frey carefully selected seed parents, collected and planted the seed, and nurtured her small plants to maturity, selecting plants of promise, and introducing them to begonia lovers by means of *The Begonian*. She has been respecially successful with rexes.

Mrs. Frey was first written up in *The Begonian* in March, 1941, in which her photograph in her cloth-house appeared, along with a description of her hybrid begonia X Elsie M. Frey. She was the first begonia hybridist to receive the coveted Alfred D. Robinson Award, which was awarded for her begonia x Silver Star in January, 1954, and presented to her by Glenn A. Motchman, National President of the American Begonia Society, and Mrs. Edna Korts, awards chairman, on the occasion of the Branch's fourteenth anniversary in May, 1954.

Although Mrs. Frey is no longer active in the Branch, she maintains her membership and she and her husband, Wm. B. Frey, who is now retired, maintain her interest in rex, rhizomatous, and fibrous begonias. She has a glasshouse for the rexes and tender begonias. In a garden surrounded on three sides by her house, Mrs. Frey grows the fibrous and rhizomatous begonias which must have partial shade. In the open location where her former cloth-house stood, she grows the more sun-tolerant types of begonias. Throughout her years of hybridizing, Mrs. Frey kept a careful list of her crosses, which follow:

> Begonias Produced By Mrs. Elsie M. Frey

1939—B. X Elsie M. Frey (B. baumanni x B. Limminghei). Fibrous rooted basket type, smooth-leaved, evergreen, short stems, leaves dark green above, red beneath. Flowers medium large, pink, males dropping off early. Female flowers remain and are fragrant. Propagated by leaves

or stem cuttings. Flowers sterile. Grown well, it makes a well-filled basket.

There is also a green-leaved B. X Elsie M. Frey. The leaves are light green above and below. The flowers and growth are the same as the above.

- 1941—B. X calla lily perfecta. A second generation seedling of pink flowering cally lily crossed with a largeflowering red semperflorens cultorum begonia. Varigated foliage, flowers red.
- 1941—B. X Little Jewel calla lily (B. x pink flowering calla lily x Bijou de jardin). Like B. x Bijou de jardin in growth and flower except that the leaves are varigated green and white as the calla type. Flowers red, double.

1941—B. X Pauline. (B. micranthera var. fimbriata x B. Limminghei). Tender semi-tuberous, glossy green leaves, basket trailing type, flowers orange-red in clusters.

1942—B. X r. c. (rex cultorum) Bonny Jean (B. Cathayana x r. c. Countess Louise Erdody). Similar to Prince Charming but spiral leaved.

1942—B. X r. c. Prince Charming (B. Cathayana x r. c. Countess Louise Erdody) Medium-sized leaves, slightly serrated and pointed, dark-gray center and bordered with lighter zone, soft pink hairs over all, giving it the appearance of being pink; growth slightly upright branching.

1943—B. X r. c. Amethyst. Smooth medium-large leaves of amethyst and silver.

1943—B. X r. c. Bing Cherry. Medium large leaf with bing-cherry red in center and bordered with a zone of tiny speckles of red and silver.

1943—B. X r. c. Winesap. Dark green center bordered with a light red zone with a bit of silver between it and the border. Medium size leaf.

1944—B. x Richard the First (B. X White Shasta x B. dichroa). Cane up to 4 or 5 feet tall, leaves green, large clusters of orange red flowers. Very prolific bloomer during the summer months.

1944—B. X Richard the Second (B. X White Shasta x B. dicroa). Same as above but with lighter flowers.

1944—B. X Richard the Third (B. X White Shasta x B. dichroa). Same as above but grows only to 3 feet tall and has fragrant deep pink flowers in clusters.

1944—B. X r. c. Cranberry. Medium size leaf, silver and rose pink over all.

1945—B. x Green Star (B. carolineafolia x B. Liebmanni). Rhizomatous. Leaves moderately 5-7 lobed, green.

1945—B. X Evelyn Grant (B. McBethi x B. dicroa). Small upright fibrous; medium leaves, green with red eye, wavy edge; flowers in large clusters, salmon red. *BEGONIAN* 1952, page 243.

1945—B. X r. c. Melba. Medium large leaves with outstanding veins of silvery green, red and black between.

afolia X B. Liebmanni). Rhizomatous, leaves moderately 5-7 lobed, silver above, red beneath, flowers very pale pink.

1948—B. X r. c. Robin (B. dregei x r. c. unidentified). Miniature Rex. Upright growth, leaf larger than B. r. c. Thrush. The center of the leaf is robin-red extending over two thirds of the leaf, veins red changing to silver to the edge of the leaf, rest of leaf olive-green, narrow redmargined edge which is pointed and serrate. Under side of the leaf wine red; sparsely hairy, otherwise shiny.

1948—B. X r. c. Thrush (B. dregei x r. c. unidentified). Miniature rex. Upright growth, leaves medium small, olive-green background with an over all of little silver speckles, dark red beneath, flowers beautifully with rose-pink flowers.

1948—B. x r. c. Starling. (B. dregei x r. c. unidentified). Miniature rex. Upright growth; leaves medium small, center rose running out into the silver zone, small slightly raised splotches of silver between the veins, veins bright green, main veins slight-

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- ly speckled with black. The border is a very narrow margin of rose; the leaf is inclined to be changeable as to color.
- 1949—B. x Bob-o-link. (B. Limminghei x B. X Richard First). Basket type, fibrous, smooth green leaves, salmonrose flowers in drooping clusters.
- 1949—B. X r. c. Dottie. (B. Cathayana x r. c. unnamed spiral). Upright growth, large leaves, beautiful soft gray-green with silver spots, soft red hairs all over, sterile, very pretty.
- 1949—B. X r. c. Elsie's Black Beauty.
 (B. Cathayana x r. c. unnamed spiral). Upright growth, large leaves, soft, dark hairy, spiral, good bloomer, sterile.
- 1949—B. X Florence Carrell. (B. Limminghei x B. incarnata). Basket type; branches somewhat upright at first, then drooping or hanging over edge of basket; smooth green leaves, beautiful, salmon-pink flowers in clusters, stands out-of-doors in lathhouse during Santa Barbara winter.
- 1949—B. r. c. Gretel. (B. incarnata X r. c. Moss Agate). Leaves medium small, long rather than round as Hansel, upright growth, leaves brilliant rose over silver, flowers pink with auxiliary leaves by flowers.
- 1949—B. X r. c. Hansel. (B. incarnata x B. r. c. Moss Agate). Leaves and plant small, low growing, leaves deep rose with some silver, leaf rather round.
- 1950—B. r. c. Avila. Medium to large leaf, spiral of black, center and border with silver & red zone.
- 1950—B. x r. c. Cutie (B. dregei x r. c. unnamed spiral). Miniature rex. Dark green veins, silver body with pink overlay; pale green margin shading to rose, 3 inch spiral leaves. Very compact plant.
- 1950—B. x Erika Weber. (B. X Houghtoni x B. bradei). Hairy, leaves dark green above and red beneath. Growth upright and drooping. Makes a good basket plant; also can be grown in pots or open shaded bed. Flowers medium, white with red hairs on back of petals. Stigmas

- on female flowers colored orange. Prolific bloomer.
- 1950—B. X Glorietta. (B. X Houghtoni x B. x bradei). Similar in growth and color to B. Erika Weber except the leaves and flowers are much larger but not as abundantly produced.
- 1950—B. X Harvey. (B. manicata aurea crispa x Mazae nigricans). Rhizomatous, slightly upright, darkish leaves, deep-pink flowers, fragrant, beautiful in bloom.
- 1950—B. X Lois Applegate (B. X Houghtoni x B. bradei). Same type of growth as B. X Erika Weber but light-green leaves with light-green beneath, flowers large, white with pink hairs on backs of petals, suggestive of apple blossoms.
- 1950—B. X r. c. Mary Sue. Large-leafed plant with silver zone and lavender.
- 1950—B. X r. c. White Robe. (B. dregei x r. c. spiral). Miniature rex. Small leaf, white shading to silvergray at edge with slightly light-pink overtone.
- 1952—B. X Aida. (B. micranthera variety fimbriata x B. Mazae). Beautiful basket plant, satiny light green leaves; many stems; fragrant salmonpink flowers.
- 1952—B. X Polly Cooper. (B. micranthera variety fimbriata X B. incarnata). Semi-tuberous; light-green, slightly hairy leaves; orange flowers, fragrant; shy grower but pretty.
- 1953—B. x Rhea. (B. imperialis x B. Barkeri). Rhizomatous, light-green leaf, slightly soft-haired; flowers white; medium leaves.
- 1953—B. x Roxie. (B. imperialis x B. Barkeri) Rhizomatous, soft-green leaf with a silver sheen all over; medium leaves; flowers white, tinged with pink.
- 1953—B. X Seb. (B. imperialis x B. Barkeri). Rhizomatous, large darkgreen leaf, red beneath; flowers larger than above two, white, tinged pink.
- 1953—B. X Tangerine (B. imperialis x B. micranthera variety fimbriata). Rhizomatous, small soft-green leaves,

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orange flowers.

1953—B. X Venice. (B. acetosa x B. venosa). Same growth as venosa, not tall; leaves of same size, the new leaves as they unfold show silver white hairs on upper surface; flowers small, white; has sheaths on stalk as venosa. Begonian page 203, 1958. A. B. S. Register 133.

1956—B. x r. c. Concord. (R. r. c. Queen of Hanover X B r. c. Midnight). Spiral rex, medium-large

leaves, concord-grape color.

1956-B. x r. c. Plum Duff. Mediumsmall leaves, center bright red, veins dark-green, silver zone, border darkgreen with black and red, tiny red points.

1956—B. r. c. Raspberry Crush. Mediumsize plant and leaves; leaves silver with an over all color of rose pink,

- 1956—B. X r. c. Star Blush. Large-leafed rex with black center and bordered with zone of red with silver.
- 1957—B. X r. c. Baby Face. (B. Dregei x r. c.). Miniature Rex. Tiny silver leaf with bright rose center, with black spreading out into the veins to one-half inch, sometimes whole leaf is covered with bright rose.
- 1957—B. X r. c. Dainty Sue. (B. Dregei x r. c.). Miniature Rex. Small leaf, small dark center, narrow black border, bright dark-red zone with streaks of lighter bright-silvery red.
- 1957—B. X r. c. Dark Moon. (B. Dregei x r. c.). Miniateur Rex. Very small leaf, burgundy in color with black center.
- 1957—B. x Frey's Pride. (B. Dregei x r. c.). Miniature Rex. Small leaf, serrate edge, tiny black center, large zone of brilliant rose running into points slightly edged with silver, border (except for points) green inner, and deep red outer, with dots of silvery bright rose.
- 1957—B. X r. c. Ruby Glow. B. Dregei x r. c.). Miniature Rex. Upright growth, leaves medium-small, rubyred, center black, running out into the main veins and changing to silver at the edge; border slightly

- darker divided by silver veins.
- 1958—B. X Capri (B. imperialis x B. heracleifolia variety). Small rhizomatous, leaf olive-green, hairy, very soft, low growth with many leaves, flowers white.
- 1958—B. r. c. Chickadee. Spiral-leafed rex with wide fan-like stem at start of leaf, quite ruffled edges, whole leaf olive-green with tiny speckles of silver over all, darker center and border of light lavender.
- 1958—B. X r. c. El Bosque. Upright growth, spiral leaf, smooth, large, of shiny silver and lavender-red.
- 1958—B. X r. c. Little Pal. (B. incarnata x r. c.). Small leaf of thin texture, dark-red with bright lighter red and silver zone.
- 1958—B. x r. c. Sir Joshua. (B. incarnata x r. c.). Medium-large leaf, thin textures, all a brilliant red running out to points, edged with silver, bordered in black with a few dots of brilliant red interrupted by the points, slightly upright growth.
- 1959—B. X Eunice Too (B. Paulensis x B. vellozoana). Leaves shiny olivegreen, slightly puckered, red under side, leaves red when opening, flowers large, white, with stiff red hairs on back of petals; low growing.
- 1961—B. X r. c. Bittersweet. Large leaf, all gray except center has a spot of dark gray, border dark gray; flowers large and pink.
- 1961—B. X r. c. Black Hawk. Mediumsize leaf, black with zone of dark
- 1961—B. X r. c. Bliss. Medium-small leaf, pointed, slightly waved edge. Center large area of bright rose. Zone light green; border rose intermingled with green. Tiny speckled dark-green veins from center to edge, main and small veins. Leaves stand erect, very pretty.
- 1961—B. X r. c. Bob Frey. Medium leaves, slightly-waved edges, center reddish black, border same, zone of bright green with small splotches elongated between veins starting in (Continued on Page 209)

No. 1—B. masoniana—

Syn. B. 'Iron Cross'. Introduced in England in 1952 by Mason. Said to be one of the most beautiful begonias in cultivation. Leaves are large and puckered, Nile-green, marked with a contrasting bold pattern of brown-red, resembling the German iron cross. Stems are white-hairy and reddish. Flowers are waxy, greenish white, with maroon bristles on the back. At first the plants will resemble the rex type begonia, but according to authorities on begonias, it bears no relation to this group of plants. Seeds are fresh, hand-pollinated, and should germinate in four to five weeks under greenhouse conditions; otherwise allow more time. Plenty of seed available. \$1.00 per pkt.

No. 2-B. josephi-

India. Variable begonia, with small, ovate orbicular leaves, sometimes lobed, usually peltate when young; usually stemless; flowers small, rose-pink. Requires moist, humid air. 50 cents per pkt.

No. 3—B. xanthina—

India. Thick rhizome, ovate leaves which are cordate. Flowers are medium size and conspicuously yellow. 50 cents per pkt.

No. 4—B. megeptera—

India. Leaves unequalled at the base. A large number of elongated peduncles rise from the upper axils, bearing a few pink flowers on each. The flowers completely cover the plant, creating a pleasing effect. 50 cents per pkt.

No. 5—B. picta—

India. Tuberous variety found growing on rocks in crevices of stone walls. The flowers are rather large and conspicuous and a pale rose color. The leaves are nearly equally cordate pilose above and often variegated. Very ornamental. 50 cents per pkt.

No. 6—B. deliciosa—

Syn. B. Bhotan species. Medium, bushy, smooth. Branches frequently angle off from thickened red joints and, if near the soil, will send out roots. Leaves

deeply palmately lobed but not as much as B. diadema, dark olive-green, heavily gray-spotted, red beneath. Flowers large, soft pink, usually in two-flowers inflorescences. From India. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 7—B. rubro-venia—

India. Caulescent plant, with elliptic, lanceolate, acuminate leaves. Can be recognized easily by its rose-colored veins, especially on the under side of the leaves, and by its grayish-white, large, irregular patches on the upper surfaces of the green leaves. The flowers are borne in axillary peducles, usually branched near the top, bearing white flowers. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 8—B. Brazil species—

Extremely beautiful, rather large-growing plant, with medium-sized, heavily white-felted leaves. The deep white felt covers both sides of the leaves as well as the blooms and seed pods. Very attractive begonia. 50 cents per pkt.

No. 9-B. molecaulis-

Brazil. Velvety, oval leaves, green on both sides. Stems succulent. Flowers pink or white. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 10—B. Mexican species no. 38—

Rhizomatous plant, with large, lettucegreen leaves, crinkled on margins. Flowers numerous, white, on tall stems. Good plant for outdoors where climate permits. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 11—B. dayii—

Mexico. Large, thick, shiny leaves, more yellow than green, the veins heavily penciled with dark mahogany on top, dark red underneath. Flowers ivory. Plant likes warmth and dry conditions. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 12—B. hirtella—

Brazil. Identification questionable. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 13—B. popenoei—

Large plant, with light green leaves, white flowers. Grows in wet tropical forests. Rests in winter. Keep warm and dry until new growth starts. Good out-

door plant where weather is not too cold. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 14—B. sanguinea—

Brazil. Thick, leathery, oval leaves, brown over green on top; red beneath. White flowers. Makes a good basket plant. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 15—B. sutherlandi—

South Africa. Slender; stems and branches drooping, sometimes red-petioled and red-veined. Flowers yellow to orange. Graceful hanging plant. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 16—B. Philippine Islands— Small cane type with reddish leaves and pink flowers. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 17—B. sunderbruchi—

Seven-fingered to nine-fingered leaves are large, bronze-green, strikingly marked with light green veins and splotches, mottled red and green beneath. Each finger is pointed and scalloped on the edge. Stems ringed with a collar of red hairs where leaf joins. Flowers pink. 25 cents per pkt.

No. 18—B. Semperflorens—

Special mixture of several choice varieties from a grower in Florida. 25 cents per pkt.

OTHER GENERA Strelitzia nicolai—

Banana-like, shining, green, leathery leaves, having an obtuse base arranged in two ranks. Inflorescence with boatshaped, reddish bracts, cradling white flowers with a blue tongue. Seeds should be soaked for several hours before planting. Germination is slow. Five seeds for 25 cents.

Strelitzia reginae

Bird of Paradise'. Trunkless, compact, clustering but slow-growing plant, with still-leathery, concave, oblong, bluishgray leaves with pale or red midrib. Strikingly exotic, long-stemmed flowers, emerging from the green boat-shaped bracts, bordered in red, the numerous pointed petals brilliant orange, contrasting with an arrow-shaped, brilliant blue tongue. Seeds should be soaked several hours before planting. Five seeds for 25 cents.

Aruncus kneiffii-

'Goatsbeard'. Attractive, hardy peren-

nial with feathery foliage and masses of small white flowers. Satisfactory plant for semi-shade border. 25 cents per pkt.

Gladiolus tristus-

Dainty, narrow leaf; early flowering. Rapid grower with long-lasting flowers in shades of coral, white, yellow, orangered, and lavender. Very good in flower arrangements. 25 cents per pkt.

Brunsfelsia calcycina-

'Yesterday, today, and tomorrow'. Floriferous evergreen shrub with spreading branches, dark green, long elliptic, leathery leaves. Large, two-inch, rich violet to lavender flowers with small white eyes, quickly fading to white. Grow in greenhouse in cold climates. 25 cents per pkt.

Urginea maritima---

'Sea squill'. Large bulb. Leaves up to eighteen inches long and four inches wide, lance-shaped, fleshy, shiny green. Flowers numerous, whitish; flower stalk leafless, to five feet long. Novelty. 25 cents per pkt.

Amaryllis-

Dutch hybrids. White, pink, red, and candy stripes. 25 cents per pkt.

President-Elect Carl E. Naumann read the aims and purposes of the Society.

Twenty-one officers, chairmen, and directors responded to roll call.

Minutes of the July meeting were read and

approved.

The Treasurer, Earle Budd, gave the following monthly report: balance \$1133.73, income \$695.97, disbursements \$682.80, balance \$871.90. He also gave a complete annual re-

port and working capital account.

The Membership Secretary, Dorotha Waddington, gave the following monthly report: new members 78, renewals 99, monies received \$469.30, expenses \$42.02, Begonians mailed 2212. The annual report was as follows: New membership 647, renewals 1424, total 2071, drop in membership 193, monies collected \$5503.28. Mrs. Waddington expressed her thanks to the Branches and members for the work and support in obtaining the new Addressograph.

The monthly report of the Advertising Manager, Rudy Budd, was as follows: receipts

\$45.17, accounts receivable \$51.25.

The report of the Seed Fund Chairman, Florence Gee, was read. For a two month period: income \$202.74, expenses \$37.74, remitted to Treasurer \$165.00.

The President reported attending activities among the Branches during the past month, the Shade Plant Show by the Orange County Branch, and garden tours by the Long Beach Parent Chapter, the Westchester Branch, and the San Miguel Branch.

President-Elect Carl Naumann reported attending activities in the San Diego area, including a brunch at the home of Dorothy Behrends, given by the Alfred D. Robinson Branch. This affair was attended by three national officers and members from eight Branches as far north as Santa Barbara.

Roy Joyce, reporting as S'ide Librarian, said he had received a request for two sets of slides and a request from a non-member. He asked the Board's advice regarding the latter. It was decided that he should use his own discretion if slides should be available.

The committee on the judging school is working on plans for classes later in the year. Mr. Joyce has received a check for the California National Fuchsia Society for one-half of the money received from the sale of judging lessons.

Mrs. Jean Kerlin, Awards Committee Chairman, thanked the membership for their letters of constructive criticism and suggestions, which helped the committee in its work. A formal

report will be submitted.

The report of the election was follows: Mrs. Terry Olmsted for President-Elect; Howard Small for Vice-President; Mrs. Margaret B. Taylor for Secretary; and Earle E. Budd for Treasurer.

The following Branches reported: Foothill, Glendale, Inglewood, Long Beach Parent Chapter, North Long Beach, Orange County, Pasadena, Redondo Beach, Riverside, San Gabriel, Ventura, Westchester, Whittier, Alfred D. Robinson, San Miguel, San Francisco, and Sacramento.

Mrs. Hazel Snodgrass, reporting for Ventura, invited members to attend the Ventura County Fair, in which the Branch exhibits

each year.

Mr. Gold, Director from the San Francisco Barnch, reported that the Branch now has a membership of two hundred, that their exhibit in the San Francisco Flower Show took first place and that the Branch has a very active program. It was also suggested that Mrs. Olson send letters all over the world with the idea of learning new sources for obtaining seed. *The* Advertising Manager, Ruby Budd, reported as follows: receipts \$32.30, accounts receivable \$51.25.

The report of the Seed Fund Chairman, Florence Gee, was read: income \$81.15, expenses \$21.15, remitted to treasurer \$60.00, balance in revolving fund \$100.00.

It was urgently requested that material be sent by the Branches to the Historian, Mrs. Ruth Pease. Mrs. Korts made the suggestion that copies of the Branch minutes might be sent to the Historian, from which she could select items of interest to include in the history book.

Mrs. Korts reported that \$279.99 has been received by the Society from the sale of bound copies of *The Begonian*. This is all profit, since Dr. Drummond binds the books without charge and Mrs. Korts has not submitted any expenses. There are still requests for copies. Issues in the 40's are difficult to obtain. Mrs. Korts suggested that a letter of gratitude be written to Dr. Drummond.
