## Foliage Begonias Becoming More Popular In The Pacific Northwest

Here in the Pacific Northwest the tuberous begonia has long been king. With all of the new hybrids coming out, their popularity has kept increasing. The few hardy souls who preferred to raise foliage begonias were looked upon as slightly strange by their fellow growers. At the annual shows sponsored by the Seattle Begonia Society tuberous begonias took about 90% of the space.

In the last two years, however, the foliage begonias have begun to gain in popularity. One of the main reasons for this increase was the formation of a foliage begonia Study Group that met every month from 7 to 8 p.m. just prior to the regular meeting of the Seattle Begonia Society. This group began with four or five interested persons and now draws twenty or more each meeting.

One of the obstacles in the fostering of interest in foliage begonias is the absence of any major commercial grower in this area. There are a few commercial nurseries that may carry one or two common varieties of rex or semperflorens begonias. Begonias such as "Joan Strong" are popular for borders.

Consequently devotees of foliage begonias must obtain their new plants by mail from commercial growers in California and elsewhere, by trading with others, or by raising begonias from seed. Many of our members regularly purchase seed from the Kelly Seed Fund. Many interesting and different begonias may be obtained in this way. Another advantage of raising begonias from seed is that you usually obtain far more plants than you can use, and thus you have more to trade with your friends.

At each meeting of the Study Group one of the highlights is the leaf exchange. There are always several va-

rieties available for members to try their hand at raising. Many experimental projects are originated by the Study Group. Difficult to raise varieties have been propagated through the perseverance of the members. The driving force behind the Study Group. and also the supplier of many of the cuttings exchanged, is Herb Warrick, who is well known to members of the American Begonia Society as director of round robins. Herb originally formed the Study Group and has been instrumental in its growth. Herb has undoubtedly the largest and best collection of foliage begonias in the Northwest. He raises most of them in a dugout greenhouse. It is like going through a tropical forest to visit Herb's collection. Herb is also very generous in giving cuttings of any of his plants to anyone who would possibly grow them.

The foliage begonia Study Group usually discusses a specific topic related to the culture of foliage begonias each meeting. Every member gets in on the discussion, and in this way more people get to participate and become "involved" in Club activities. This every member involvement has been one of the major factors in the growth and holding power of our Club. Besides the discussion and leaf exchange, the Study Group also takes part in other activities as a unit. At the present time members are raising over 300 cuttings to be given away to interested visitors at our annual show to be held July 31 and August 1, 1965. Also at the show the Study Group will put in a special display of foliage begonias. At the May meeting of the Seattle Begonia Society, the Study Group put on the entire program with about ten members talking approximately five minutes each on their particular specialty. This was a program enjoyed by all. It was especially interesting to note the much higher quality of plants shown.

Perhaps we will never be able to match the size and quality of foliage begonias raised in California and other semi-tropical areas, but we are improving and the foliage begonia is coming in to its own.

## YOUR SNAPSHOTS, PLEASE

Two years ago, with extreme hope in our hearts, my husband and I suggested a SNAPSHOT DIVISION to be included in the Show Schedule of the AMERICAN BEGONIA SOCIE-TY for their annual Show and Convention. It was rather late before the information could appear in the BE-GONIAN but we were cheered by the results and a nice display was made of the pictures and a trophy and ribbons awarded. The public enjoyed these snapshots and there were almost always several people reading the comments regarding the picture and making notes.

Last year, the ABS Flower Show and Convention were held at the LOS ANGELES STATE and COUNTY ARBORETUM where more than 10,-000 visitors came through the gates during the three day Show over the Labor Day weekend. We received and displayed the snapshots sent in last year — there were a good many and most of them were quite good pictures — with all of these visitors a great deal of interest was shown and many of them stopped by our educational table to tell us how much they enjoyed reading and seeing plants grown in other parts of the country, telling us that they used to live back there or that they had relatives in that part of the country.

Again this year our ABS Flower Show and Convention are to be held at the LOS ANGELES STATE and COUNTY ARBORETUM where again we may expect in excess of 10,-000 visitors to come and view the lovely plants entered by our members-BUT, unless you will send in your snapshot of your lovely begonias these 10,000 visitors will not know what you can do in your town; so my husband and I are making a PLEA – please send us that picture or pictures of your favorite begonia or begonias. We are proud of this division and iealous of it too - we want it to be one of the BIG divisions of the Show. Any member outside of the state of California may enter as many pictures in this division as they wish. Let's really make the judges work on this division this year. The sooner the better - we want to frame attractively each entry – and speak for our allotted space early so please-.

# Clayton M. Kelly Seed Fund Flight

## No. 1 — B. Brazil sp.

Collected on road from Sao Paulo to Caraguatatuba at an elevation of 2300 feet. This is a miniature, trailing type with a beautiful small, roundish, emerald-green leaf, red underneath, found growing on damp, south slope at edge of a steep cliff. The collector is uncertain as to color of flowers but the seed pods were quite large which would indicate the flowers are large and probably pink. Price 50 cents per pkt.

## No. 2 – B. Brazil sp.

Collected 10km past Salesopolis at 2800 feet elevation. Plant found growing in an opening in dense forests and is described as an attractive begonia with good white flowers, velvety green leaves. Cane type variety. Price 50 cents per pkt.

## No. 3 – B. Brazil sp.

Collected 88km from Tiete canyon at 1900 feet elevation. Exceptionally nice plant with beautiful leaves and many, small flowers. The collector pulled a clumb of this plant from a rock cliff using his collapsble orchd collection pole but it was too badly damaged for a picture. Price 50 cents per pkt.

## No. 4 – B. Brazil sp.

Seeds collected from dense forest near Tiete canyon—plants found growing on rocks in moist gulley. Medium growth. Price 50 cents per pkt.

## No. 5 – B. Erythrophylla helix

Also known erroneously as B. Conchaefolia to which it bears neither relationship nor resemblance. Seeds are from a very beautiful plant with huge leaves, double spiralled and very ruffled dark green above and red beneath. Pink flowers in great profusion. Prce 50 cents per pkt.

### No. 6 – B. 'Houston' (B. incarnata sandersi X 42S seedling)

A hybrid with very dark leaves and pink flowers, medium bushy plant— Price 35 cents per pkt. The last two begonias mentioned are plants belonging to Ethel Shuler, Ohio who has pollinated the blooms by hand and furnished seed for the Seed Fund. This is a task that very few people will undertake so please be grateful to Mrs. Shuler for this.

## No. 7 - Rex hybrids

Many colors and combinations of spirals and others from crosses that produce several shades of red. They have been especially grown to produce the most beautiful shades of purples and red. Price 1.00 per pkt.

No. 8 – B. 'Verde Grande' (B. manicata X B. 'Dark Sheen')

Exceptionally fine new star leaf of smoothest green satin, trimmed with blue-black markings on the edge; pale eye and radiating veins. Strong and vigorous. Price 35 cents per pkt.

No. 9 – B. 'Fuscomaculata' (B. heracleifolia X B. strigillosa)

Sometimes called 'Rubellina.' Graygreen, star-shaped leaves lightly chocolate-splotched, drooping on long, lax stems. Price 25 cents per pkt.

## No. 10 – B. 'Joe Hayden.' (B. Reichheimi' X B. mazae)

Large, dark-sheened star leaves with bright cream spot at stem; red beneath gives a reversible effect. Rhizomes creeps, divides, creates a shapely plant. Can be grown outdoors where climate is not too severe. Price 25 cents per pkt.

## No. 11 – B. heracleifolia 'Venus.'

A form of B. 'Heracleicotyle' with darker green foliage. Price 25 cents per pkt.

### No. 12 – B. 'Rickey Minter' X B. 'Joe Hayden.'

A cross that could produce at least one plant of 'Rickey Minter' from a package of seed. Price 25 cents per pkt.

## No. 13 – B. sceptrum.

Resembling the aconite or monkshood. Silky, dark green leaves with sunken veins, cut deeply to separate the points then cut again to branch like antlers; irregularly and faintly silver-spotted. Price 25 cents per pkt.

### No. 14 - B. Rhizomatous.

Mixed seed from a friend in The Philippine Islands—from a large collection of unusual plants. Price 25 cents per pkt.

No. 15 – B. Rhizomatous.

Mixed seed from a grower in Florida who has furnished seed before and they always produce something unusual and beautiful – many with dark leaves. Price 25 cents per pkt.

No. 16 – B. Mme. 'Fanny Giron' (B. tuberous hybrid X B. incarnata)

Fibrous rooted, evergreen; branches drooping; leaves ovate, long-pointed, toothed, green; flowers bright crimson. An ornamental begonia used as a hanging basket. Price 25 cents per pkt.

## No. 17 - B. Organdy mixture.

An excellent mixture of F one hybrids in shades of red, pink and white. Well adapted for outdoor bedding, even in full sun. Price 25 cents per pkt.

#### Greenhouse plants -

Streptocarpus seedling. Described as being from choice plant. Price 25 cents per pkt.

## Chirita ĥamosa

Chirita hamosa – bright blue bells in winter. Price 25 cents per pkt.

### Rhytidophyllum tomentosum

Gesneriad from the mountains of Cuba. Can be grown outdoors in mild climates, continuous bloomer. Can send additional information with seed. Price 25 cents per pkt.

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## "BUMBLIN' ALONG WITH BEE"

Mack Barnette of Flight 12 asks: "We are told that begonias like lots of humidity but how much is "lots"? Are their requirements in this respect so varied as to preclude a generalization that they need a relative humidity of -%? I have a humidiguide so that I can tell what humidity I do have but whether or not it is even close to the required amount, I haven't the faintest".

Dear Mack: In researching this question, I have checked through each and every book in the library seeking humidity guides in the raising of begonias. Much time has been spent telling the reader that begonias must have humidity and in methods of producing this needed humidity. Also they tell us that in dry weather it will be necessary to fog, spray, wet down the walls and paths to produce this humidity – they warn that during long rainy periods we must not water we must endeavor to have sufficient ventilation to help to dry the soil since begonias are unable to exist in continuously wet soil - but they do not mention a degree of humidity. So, I had to rely on commercial catalogs, literature from commercial houses putting out equipment, lights etc. They generally agree that the recommended humidity for most plants is between 50% and 60% for normal growth. If in your greenhouse you are using the fogging method to create the desired humidity you no doubt will find with your humidiguide that the percentage of humidity will vary somewhat in different areas of your house - for instance the humidity will naturally be higher right next to the fogger and gradually decrease as you get farther from the fogger. This should be ideal. We all know as we read about the backgrounds of the various begonias and learn where each begonia was found to be growing by the collector

that they have been found from the teeming jungle to arid and rocky areas where the only humidity was provided by the rock's ability to hold on to the moisture. Also they are found at various heights from low rain forest beds to high on a canyon wall. Thus we know that according to species the begonia's need for a definite percentage of humidity varies. Now all you need to do Mack is to decide just which begonia needs the highest humidity and place it nearest the fogger, and so on down the bench to the one that requires the least. If time permits you to work with your plants until you have found where each plant is happiest you might make notes as to the humidity requirements as you have found them for the individual plants and thus provide a guide for the rest of us who would so love to have this information. If any of you members have more precise information on this subject I would be most happy if you would send it along to me.

M.C.S. of Columbia Mo. asks: "I'd like some help in finding the best cigar smoke tolerant begonias suitable for a 70 degree plus temperature with south, west and eastern exposures. I can control humidity so that's not my problem. I want to start plants this spring and summer to be used this fall and winter indoors so any information you can give me will be appreciated."

1. All exhibits are, from the commencement to the close of the exhibition, in the charge of the Show Committee.

2. Competitive entries must be made according to division and classes.

3. All competitive entries must be in place by 9:30 a.m., Saturday, September 4 and judging will commence at 10:00 a.m. All entries not in by 9:30 a.m. will be eligible only for non-competitive exhibition.

4. All entries will receive sealed entry cards at times of entering plants, allowing same to remain sealed until after juding.

5. Chairman of Judges Committee will assume complete charge at start of judging and no person will be allowed to interfere, to offer criticisms, or to distract the decisions of the judges. Only judges and their clerks will be permitted in show room at time of judging.

6. Any chairman or members of committees engaged in the show preparation will be permitted to exhibit and to compete under the same conditions as any other exhibitor, with adherence to all show rules.

7. Each entry may compete for only one class award and only one entry per exhibitor may be made in any class with the exception of Division K.

8. All plants and flowers exhibited in competitive classes must have been grown by the exhibitor and have been in his possession for three months prior to the show. This rule does not apply to flower arrangements. Only class award blue ribbon winners may be considered for trophy awards in the novice, amateur, and commercial divisions.

9. Novice: A novice is an amateur who enters A.B.S. competition for the first time and he remains a novice for three consecutive years, after which he must enter in the amateur class. In the event a novice wins a total of five blue ribbons or wins one of the A.B.S. trophy awards prior to the expiration of this three year period he must thereafter enter as an amateur.

10. Amateur: An amateur is one who grows plants for self-pleasure and by selfeffort and does not hold a commercial license. Any member of the family not falling into this category disqualifies the entire family as amateurs.

11. Commercial Grower: A commercial grower may enter any class. However, his plants will be judged only against other commercial entries. A commercial grower is a person who obtains his livelihood from the sale of plants.

12. The management shall have the right to exclude infected or diseased plants.

13. No plant may be removed from the show except by official permission.

14. While the management will exercise due caution and care in safeguarding exhibits, it cannot assume responsibility for loss or injury.

15. Judges shall award premiums as in their opinion an entry merits. Whether a group of entries is in competition, or an entry is without competition, it will be at their discretion to award only on merits. The decision of the judges is final.

16. Sweepstakes trophies will be awarded on total number of blue ribbons only in begonia divisions. In case of a tie, second and third place ribbons will be counted on the basis of 3 points for first place, 2 points for second place, and 1 point for third place.

17. All trophies must remain on display for the duration of the flower show.

18. Individual entries in the competitive show are open to all, members or non-members.

19. Challenge trophies are to be returned to the A.B.S. Flower Show Chairman four weeks prior to the 1966 A.B.S. Flower Show.

20. Any container, wire, clay, ceramic, wood, or metal, without hanger wires, may be entered as a potted plant.

21. Pictures submitted in Division V should be accompanied by the following information, which will be needed if they are reproduced in *The Begonian*: Name and address of exhibitor, name of exhibitor's Branch, name and approximate age of the begonia, and any interesting facts about its culture and growth.

22. Pictures submitted in Division V will not be returned to exhibitors.

23. Snapshots submitted in Division V should be sent to Mrs. Bee Olson, Research Director. They must be received no later than August 15, 1965.

24. Perpetual and challenge trophies must score 90 points or over.

25. Perpetual and challenge trophies are for A.B.S. members only.

26. Divisions H and I. You may enter one plant in both Division classes 1 to 50.

27. Synonymous names of plants are acceptable.

28. A.B.S. Perpetual and Challenge Trophies can only be won by A.B.S. members.

## Your Begonian Testing Lab

Queries by letter and within the Round Robins have asked for help in packaging and sending of begonia cuttings and rooted plants. Our Round Robin Director, Herb Warrick, has passed along some excellent suggestions as follows:

"In the grocery store get two sizes of transparent plastic food bags. "Baggies" or "Glad-Bags" are two trade names out here. The sizes are about 5" x 8" and 10" x 14". Get your cuttings in some form of pan, and sit down somewhere with time and sort them into piles of 4 or 5 cuttings each. Small cuttings for the small and large for the large bags. I sometimes send large rex leaves up to 10" in diameter and stem cuttings of canes, etc. up to 10" long. I carefully label all cuttings if the names are known. I use a laundry marking pen on pieces of white medical adhesive tape. On leaves the names just stick to the top surface. For stem cuttings or smaller leaves I just wrap one end of the adhesive strip around the stem and stick the tape to itself. Any exposed sticky portion of the tape can be rendered non-adhesive by putting a little talcum powder or dry dirt or dust on it. I just shake a little powder on the table where I am working and use my finger to pick up a little talcum to rub on the bare "stickum" of the tape. After sorting and labeling I put several cuttings in each plastic bag. I also select a small but strong cardboard box that will hold all bags snugly. I then take all bags to the sink or bring a cup full of water to where I am working. I put about one or two drops of water in each bag of cuttings. Then I seal each bag with a small rubber band such as those used for girl's pony-tail hairdos. I blow enough air into each bag to lift the bag slightly off the cuttings. The cuttings must be held lightly by the

bags and not be able to bounce around in the bags. I sandwich the cuttings of leaves and stems in each of the bags so that leaves don't lie tightly together. Put all small bags into one or two of the larger bags. Blow up the larger bag or bags to just fill the cardboard box. Also seal the large bags with small rubber bands. This arrangement makes the lightest possible package and I use air mail only for all distances over 100 or 200 miles. The cuttings go anywhere in the United States within two days and they rarely lose leaves or deteriorate in any way. Retrim the ends of cuttings before putting into propagating pans or flats. I have sent cuttings in 90 degree weather and at 40 degrees. Don't put stems in wet moss or wet facial tissue because the wet wads are just excessive weight and can act as hammers as they slosh back and forth in the bags. I have received cuttings that were pounded into a mush-like mass from such movement. By putting only a few cuttings in each plastic bag there is little possibility of movement and damage. A package of about 30 good size cuttings is only about 8" x 8" x 8" and costs about 80 to 90-cents for coast to coast shipment. It is a lot of fun both to send and receive cuttings. The only difficulties that I have found in trading cuttings are that your nicest plants can be trimmed to death to get cuttings and it takes quite a bit of time to properly prepare and seed packages.
